

The story of the ship *Emanuel* (later rechristened *Restauration* following a major redesign), has many side stories that offer an opportunity to delve into various topics. Shipbuilding, the herring trade, the industries that support the fishing trade, trade routes around the Skagerak and Kattegat, and the economic ebb and flow of economic life for Norway, Sweden, Denmark, and Scotland from the 18<sup>th</sup> through the early 20th centuries. The list could go on. As promised, however, this edition will be on shipbuilding.

Clinker building, also known as lapstrake construction, is a traditional northern European method of boatbuilding that reached its most sophisticated form in the Viking Age (c. 800–1100 CE). The defining characteristic of this technique is the overlapping of planks along their edges. Instead of laying planks edge to edge as in later carvel construction, clinker planking involves fastening each plank so that it slightly overlaps the one beneath it, producing a stepped appearance on the hull. The planks were typically fastened with iron rivets or wooden treenails, and the seams were made watertight using animal hair, moss, or tarred wool caulking.

One of the main advantages of clinker construction was its combination of strength and flexibility. Because the planks overlapped, the hull had greater longitudinal stiffness, yet the fastening method allowed a certain degree of movement between planks. This flexibility was particularly important in the rough and variable conditions of the North Atlantic, where ships needed to withstand heavy seas without cracking. The lightweight nature of clinker-built vessels also made them easier to pull onto beaches or transport over land, which suited the needs of Norse raiders and traders who operated in diverse environments from river systems to open oceans. The clinker technique was not only a practical innovation but also a cultural marker of

Scandinavian maritime identity. Archaeological finds such as the Gokstad and Oseberg ships exemplify the high level of craftsmanship achieved by Viking shipwrights. These vessels demonstrate how clinker construction allowed for long, narrow hulls with shallow drafts—ships that were fast, maneuverable, and capable of both sailing and rowing. Over time, clinker construction spread to the British Isles and beyond, influencing boatbuilding traditions in regions where Norse contact was strong. While carvel planking eventually displaced clinker for large seagoing vessels in the late medieval period, clinker traditions continued in smaller craft, surviving well into the modern era in Nordic and North Atlantic communities.

### **Norwegian Election: Labor Party Wins**

During your editor's recent travels, the nightly television, newspapers, and radio were consumed with reporting on the upcoming election. Debates and town hall meeting were held daily with party leadership going head-to-head. In the end, Jonas Gahr Støre led the Labor Party to victory with 79% of the population turning out. Labor achieved 28.2% but the biggest winner was the populist Progress Party which doubled it voter share, achieving 23.9%.

Another big story in the news was the selection by the Norwegian Government of the British Type 26 frigate. The total of five frigates are set to be delivered by 2030 and have a price tag of \$13.5 billion and are seen as the replacement for the *Fridtjof Nansen*-class frigates. Set to be built at BAE's shipyard in Clyde, Scotland, this was a big win for BAE and the British government; but, more importantly, NATO will benefit from this enhancement of anti-submarine capabilities and a significant reinforcement of the NATO northern flank.

## Hazelnut Toscakaka

(taken from Sons of Norway Recipe Box)



### Ingredients:

For the Cake 4 extra large eggs 1 1/4 cups granulated sugar 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour 2/3 cup butter

For the Topping
2/3 cup hazelnuts (roughly chopped)
1/2 cup granulated sugar
3 Tbsp. milk
1 Tbsp. all-purpose flour

### **Directions**

Preheat the oven to 350°F. For the cake, melt butter and set aside to cool. Whisk the eggs and sugar together until light yellow and fluffy. Add the flour and melted butter until just combined. Pour the batter into a springform pan lined with parchment paper and bake for about 45 minutes. Check to see if it's done by inserting a toothpick or wooden skewer into the cake. If it comes out clean, the cake is done. If batter sticks, bake for an additional 5 minutes and test again.

When done, remove the cake from the oven but leave it in the springform pan. For the topping, place all topping ingredients into a saucepan and bring to a boil. Once a boil is achieved, immediately pour the mixture onto the cake and spread evenly across the top. Return the cake to the oven and continue baking; only using the top heat (broiler) if possible until it looks golden brown. About 5-10 minutes.

Remove from the oven and allow it to cool before removing from the springform pan. Enjoy!

### **Driving Through Scotland and Norway**

The Kennedys took a driving tour through Scotland and Norway in August. The Scotland leg was to visit some of the places we knew from our time when I was stationed with the Royal Air Force as an exchange officer in a program where our military sends an officer over and brings one of their officers over in a program to strengthen international partnerships and enhance military effectiveness.

We attended the Edinburgh Military Tattoo, and walked all over the town for three days seeing the sights prior to participating in a tour around the north of Scotland including the Orkney Islands. In Orkney we saw Scapa Flow and visited the Italian Church, both tied to the history of the area during World War II, as well as Skara Brae, a five thousand year old Neolithic village and UNESCO World Heritage Site. We visited a local museum detailing the herring trade. This was one of the highlights for me as it complemented research on the evolution of the herring trade in Norway. Prior to its historic voyage to New York in 1825, *Restauration* was involved in the herring trade, transporting the herring-filled barrels to market.

Those visiting Orkney quickly notice the strong Scandinavian influence in the language, customs, and flag. The islands of Orkney and Shetland were part of the Norwegian and Danish kingdoms until their annexation by Scotland in 1472.

Another connection to Norway that I found was the training site for commandos trained at Achnacarry Castle during World War II as part of the Commando Basic Training Centre (CBTC). During the war, 25,000 personnel were trained, many of whom were from allied countries. One of those nations was Norway and they received rigorous training in commando skills, physical endurance, and combat techniques before serving in coastal raids and specialized operations.

And then it was on to Norway. The main reason for the trip was to travel with Tove's sister to The Sail hotel (*Seilet*) in Molde. You can see by the picture how the name came about. From there we visited Åndalsnes for a day to ride the gondola and visit *Tindesenter's* museum. The trip back was a list of some of the most spectacular scenery in western Norway: Trollstigen (with its eleven hairpin turns), Geiranger Fjord (arriving

by Ørnevegen and leaving to the east to visit Lom Stavkirke. The drive back to Hamar took us along the rivers Otta and Lågen, and Lake Mjøsa. The weather throughout was truly spectacular.



### Crown Prince Haakon to Visit U.S.A.

H.R.H. Crown Prince Haakon of Norway is coming to the United States as a part of the celebration marking the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of organized immigration from Norway to the United States aboard *Restaurasjonen*. His visit will be from October 6-8 and his itinerary has him visiting Decorah, Iowa, Minneapolis, MN, and New York City. Joining the visit will be Foreign Minister Espen Barth Eide and Minister of Trade and Industry Cecilie Myrseth.

### Gamlehaugen

This year is the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Gamlehaugen becoming HRH King Harold's official residence in Bergen. In celebration, the King, Queen, Crown Prince, and Crown Princess opened their residential park lands to the public with an outdoor concert and program. The event was televised nationally.

Near the home, now a museum, of Edvard Grieg, Gamlehaugen is one of the many royal houses of Norway. Most recognize the Royal Palace and its iconic position at the end of Karl Johans Street in Oslo where the King and Queen live. Lesser known, however, are some of the other residences used by the Royals. family.

The Royal Farm is located on the Bygdøy peninsula in Oslo and is used as a summer residence. Another summer palace on Bygdøy is Oscarshall and it is open to the public as a museum during the summer. Also, on the outskirts of Oslo is the Royal Lodge used during the winter and is where the Royal Family spends Christmas.

In Asker, outside of Oslo, is Skaugum Estate, the official residence of the Crown Prince and Crown Princess.

Others around the country include Mågero (in Tjøme), Stiftsgården (in Trondheim), Ledaal (in Stavanger), and, of course, Gamlehaugen.

## Who was Pillarguri?

While driving back from Molde to Hamar, we decided to stop in Otta at a little restaurant named *Pillarguri*. As I never miss an opportunity to pass along Norwegian history, here is a good story.



Pillarguri, or Pillarguritoppen, rises to 852 meters above sea level (m.o.h.) and serves as a distinctive natural landmark within Innlandet county. It occupies a scenic position between two renowned mountain ranges—Rondane and Jotunheimen—and is situated approximately two kilometers southwest of Otta.

Additionally, Pillarguri holds a deep cultural resonance in the region through its ties to a legendary figure of the same name. According to local oral tradition, Pillarguri was a woman who, during the Battle of Kringen in 1612, played her horn (prillar) atop a commanding vantage point to warn and rally Norwegian defenders against an advance by Scottish mercenaries. Her legacy endures in Otta and Sel—the municipal crest bears her image, a statue commemorates her bravery, and the town hosts an annual festival and awards ceremony in her honor.
