



Last Month's Answer



The Krigsseilermonumentet – titled "Mange skip og sjøfolk kom aldri i havn" (Many ships and sailors never reached *harbour*) – is a poignant bronze sculpture in Trondheim, Norway, honoring Norwegian merchant sailors who perished during World Wars I and II. Unveiled in 1982, it was created by renowned sculptor Kristofer Leirdal and stands on Krigsseilerplassen near the Royal Garden Hotel, close to the Nidelva. The monument serves as a solemn reminder of the sacrifices made by Norwegian seafarers. It remains a focal point for commemorations, particularly on Liberation Day (May 8), when wreathlaying ceremonies honor the memory of these sailors.

Norwegian Genealogy



Sveler Griddle Cakes



*Makes about 18 sveler

For the griddle cakes:

- 3 large eggs, at room temperature
- ³/₄ cup (150 g) granulated sugar
- ½ cup (112 g) butter, melted
- 3 cups (720 ml) buttermilk/kefir
- 3 cups (360 g) all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda

For the buttercream:

- ½ cup (112 g) butter, softened
- 2/3 cup (80 g) confectioners' sugar
- 5 tablespoons granulated sugar

In a large bowl, combine the eggs and sugar and whisk until fluffy. Whisk in the melted butter, followed by the buttermilk. Combine the flour and baking soda, add to the batter, and stir gently until combined. Let stand for about 20 minutes—the dough will swell.

Heat a takke (griddle) to medium heat or place a large frying pan directly on the stove over medium heat, and lightly butter.

Ladle some batter onto the hot griddle or pan to make several 6-inch (15 cm) round griddle cakes. Cook for 2 minutes or until bubbles appear on top and the bottoms turn golden brown. Flip the griddle cakes and cook for 2 minutes more or until the other side is golden brown. Transfer to a plate and keep warm. Continue making griddle cakes, using the remaining batter and adding butter to the takke or pan as needed.

While the griddle cakes are cooling, make the buttercream by combining the softened butter, confectioners' sugar, and granulated sugar in a bowl. Spread buttercream on the warm griddle cakes and serve them folded in half.

Store leftover cakes without filling in an airtight container or cover with foil and refrigerate for up to 3 days.

Glassverk Industriet

Hadeland Glassverk and Randsfjord Glassverk represent two facets of Norway's industrial glass history: the artistic and enduring legacy of Hadeland, and the more utilitarian and transient history of Randsfjord. Together, they illustrate the evolution of Norwegian glassmaking from the 18th century through to the modern day. This is an excellent day trip for the next time you are in Oslo.

Hadeland Glassverk was the subject of the article *Centuries of the Craft* by Linnea Henning in the May edition of the Sons of Norway magazine. For the article, click on the following link:

Hadeland Glassverk is one of the oldest industrial companies in Norway and among the oldest continuously operating glassworks in northern Europe. It was founded in 1762 by Count Christian Conrad Danneskiold-Laurvig, an admiral and also the Secretary of War for Denmark. Inspired by continental European glassworks, it produced utility glassware like bottles and jars; however, by the mid-1800s, it had transitioned to finer crystal and decorative glass. The demand grew to the extent that the company imported skilled glassblowers from abroad, contributing to a rise in quality and complexity. Today, Hadeland Glassverk operates as a combined production facility, tourist attraction, museum, and shopping center.



Examples of Hadeland products

A smaller and lesser know glass manufacturer located in the same region near Lake Randsfjorden was Randsfjord Glassverk, founded in 1863. This period coincided width the expansion of water power and transportation in Norway. The company primarily focused on bottle and window glass production, meeting the growing demand from urbanization and modernization. Unlike Hadeland, it did not significantly transition into art or crystal glass production.

Randsfjord Glassverk faced increasing competition from mass production facilities abroad in the 20th century and eventually ceased operations. Often overshadowed by the more artistically renowned Hadeland Glassverk, it still played an important role in the broader industrial heritage of the region.

Here are a few examples of the artistic products from Randsfjord Glassverk:



Name that Artifact (Answer)

When you can no longer place it into the hole, you are cut off from further drinking.

Noctourism

According to Booking.com, "noctourism" – short for nocturnal tourism – is on the rise. Nocturnal tourism is the concept of planning a holiday around experiences that occur after the sun goes down. Booking.com is so confident in "noctourism" that they predict it will be among 2025's most sought-after travel experiences. It provides a whole new world of opportunity that the regular tourist likely has not partaken in.

The trend is already evident with the Northern Lights in Norway. Searches for places in Tromsø, Norway, doubled in the months leading up to the end of October 2024, compared with the same timeframe the year prior. People are excited about the chance to see the Northern Lights and are flocking to Norway to make their dreams a reality. Norway is just one example of the gems for noctourism; there are a plethora of places around the world that hold intriguing stories after dark, just waiting to be heard.

New NATO Facility

NATO already has Combined Air Operations Centers (CAOC) in Germany and Spain and now wants a third one in Norway. The center, like the others, will "plan, direct, task, control, coordinate, supervise and support" NATO air operations in the Nordic region and Northern Europe in times of "peace, crisis and conflict," according to the prime minister's office. NATO itself is set to invest nearly NOK 9 billion in its new CAOC in Norway, which is expected to have as many as 400 employees from several NATO countries who'll be monitoring all activity in the air over the Nordic area.

Friluftstid

Always looking for new angles for stories, I like to review what is offered by other lodges. One such article was in Solbakken Lodge's newsletter. What caught my eye on the page was an advertisement for Fridjtof Nansen Lodge's 95th anniversary with a picture of a young Fridjtof Nansen (1861-1930) and his ship, *Fram*.

Whether it was intentional or not, there was an un-attributed article vacationing in Norway and friluftsliv directly below the advertisement. Nansen was one of the greatest proponents of friluftsliv. In literature, Henrik Ibsen (1828-1906) is attributed with the first use of the word, although the concept has long been a part of Norwegian life. The concept has been much studied over the last fifty years and has become championed as a environmental philosophy. Ibsen wrote in his poem På Vidderne:

I den øde Sæterstue Al min rige Fangst jeg sanker; Der er Krak og der er Grue, Friluftsliv for mine Tanker.

Here is a shortened version of the article:

Do you want to take a pleasant vacation in Norwegian nature? Then you should be prepared.

Norwegians are known for hiking in forests and fields. The Norwegian Tourist Association (DNT - Den Norske Turistforening) has a website with tour suggestions called UT.no. "We've had a 43 percent increase in the number of users," says Veronica Solbak in a press release. She is an editor for UT.no. DNT has extracted the five destinations most searched for on the website. They are: *Dronningstien* in Hardanger, *Aurlandsdalen*, tour of *Hardangervidda*, *Romsdalseggen* and *Trekanten* in Trollheimen.

Norsk Friluftsliv writes in a press release that the leave no trace movement is part of the right to roam. Allemannsretten, or the right to roam, gives you the right to use open land freely. You can hike, camp and pick berries. Outland areas are forests, mountains, marshes and coastal areas. Inland areas, are generally inaccessible to tourists, are yards, house plots, cultivated land and the like. Along with rights there is also a code of conduct. This means showing consideration for others and for nature. Above all, you must not harm nature.

As we live in Colorado, the concept of *friluftsliv* is not lost upon us. The weather will soon allow more of us to hit the trails and camp. DNT, with their wealth of experience and knowledge, has put out a set of rules (a code, if you will) to follow as you start your hiking season. If you take these rules to heart, you will have a safe and enjoyable season.

De nye fjellvettreglene - The New Mountain Rules (Good for year-round hiking and other backcountry activities)

- 1. Plan your trip and inform others about the route you have selected.
- 2. Adapt the planned routes according to ability and conditions.
- 3. Pay attention to the weather and the avalanche warnings.
- 4. Be prepared for bad weather and frost, even on short trips.
- 5. Bring the necessary equipment so you can help yourself and others.
- 6. Choose safe routes. Recognize avalanche terrain and unsafe ice.
- 7. Use a map and a compass. Always know where you are.
- 8. Don't be ashamed to turn around.
- 9. Conserve your energy and seek shelter if necessary.
